Six Black, female fundraising and philanthropy professionals you should know

It's Women's History Month, a time when we celebrate the pivotal role women have played in shaping history. But this year, Women's History Month hits a little differently amid the backdrop of a global pandemic, wealth inequality and alleged racial reckoning.

And as calls for book bans across the nation grow more strident, one group of women has, and continues to be, particularly vulnerable to being erased from historical narratives. That group is Black women.

Here's a look at six Black, female nonprofit fundraisers and philanthropy professionals you should know.

Kia Croom

Kia Croom is a 20-year nonprofit fundraising and philanthropy professional. She's raised nearly \$400 million for nonprofits across the nation, in a variety of cause areas including: STEM, Advocacy, youth development, workforce development and health and human services. She specializes in building multi-million dollar, high-impact strategic partnerships that yield impactful social returns.

In 2021, Kia founded the Black Fundraisers' Podcast to amplify the voices and lived experiences of Black nonprofit and philanthropy professionals across the globe.

Kia is a proud social entrepreneur and director of corporate relations at the Children's Defense Fund.

Birgit Smith Burton

Birgit Smith Burton is a respected leader in the fundraising profession who has raised more than \$500 million during her 33-year career. She worked as the executive director of foundation relations at the Georgia Institute of Technology (GA Tech), where she led her team in raising \$309 million toward the Institute's most recent successful \$1.8 billion capital campaign. In November 2021, she retired from GA Tech to lead the African American Development Officers (AADO) Network, an organization she founded in 1998 to provide professional development, education, employment support, mentorship and networking opportunities for Black fundraisers.

Birgit serves on the global board of the Association of Fundraising Professionals (AFP) and recently was voted as the Chair-Elect for 2021. She has the distinction of being the first Black woman in AFP's 60-year history to serve in this role.
